The first time I met Chris was at our neighborhood's first 'gathering of quilters' at

my house. She walked over to one of our walls with a frame that held several small wooden houses. She smiled at me and said, "We have the same collection – just different places." The houses represented different Army duty stations.

Chris's dad was also in the Army. She counted all the places she had lived, and the total was 26! She met her husband Jim and married him in Hawaii when her family was stationed there.

In 1976, she and Jim were transferred to Augsburg, Germany. She found some quilting magazines at the Post Exchange, liked what she saw, and her quilting journey began. She started by making quilted and appliqued pillows. Everyone got a pillow! One day it dawned on Chris that if she could make all these pillows, she could probably make a quilt. At the Babich's next assignment in Carlisle, Penn., she took her first class, learning the RIGHT way to guilt (according to Chris).

Some of her jobs when she was not sewing included (in Germany) dance instructor and math tutor. When they moved to Ft. Hauchuca in Arizona, she got her master's degree in counseling and started working for the Army Career and Alumni Program (ACAP). It is a program that helps soldiers and their families transition to civilian life. Within six months she was the manager of the local program.

Chris and Jim moved to New Bern in 2010. She had two goals: win a golf tournament and win a ribbon for one of her guilts. She found the ribbon the bigger challenge, but she has done both.

And as a final note – that woman who moved 26 times passed that life path to her son, Bryan, who was just promoted to general in the US Army!

It is that time again when we begin the frenzy of activities for the upcoming show. Twice Around Treasures is a large part of profits and a "first stop" for many of our devoted attendees. We would like to take this opportunity to share with you, the guidelines set forth to make this an efficient, profitable, and fun experience for all.

WELCOMED DONATIONS:

- 100% cotton fabric
- Quilting notions such as rulers, patterns, thread, stencils, scissors and quilt books

Based on experiences of past chair ladies, PLEASE DO NOT DONATE:

- · Batting scraps
- Polyester blend, wool, upholstery, or apparel fabric
- Magazines
- Sewing machines
- Quilt frames
- Patterns for apparel, toys, home dec
- Craft supplies (one would think that this would be a great outlet and source for crazy quilt supplies, but historic sales have disproved this theory). We have buttons are an exception to the rule.
- Books more than 15 years old (this seems like a short time, however the internet, web sites, Pinterest), in addition to the technologies of quilting tools and accessories, has had a tremendous impact of how and what we quilt). Newer books will be accepted after 4 pm during the Wednesday setup on April 9.

Please note that **once an item is donated it is out of your control**. Items donated outside of the established guidelines will be redonated/dispersed at the discretion of the TAT committee. Please contact Christine Youngs (607-244-6877) or Sue Portwood (607-329-7199) with any questions.
